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linguistics an introduction to linguistic theory is a textbook written for introductory courses in linguistic theory for undergraduate linguistics majors and first year graduate students by twelve major figures in the field each bringing their expertise to one of the core areas of the field morphology syntax semantics phonetics phonology and language acquisition in each section the book is concerned with discussing the underlying principles common to all languages showing how these are revealed in language acquisition and in the specific grammars of the world's languages key book features written by twelve linguists all internationally recognized as leaders in their fields of specialization exercises and data analysis problems within and at end of each chapter help students learn what it means to actually do linguistics includes the latest developments in theoretical linguistics for example optimality theory other pedagogical tools include extensive

glossary of key terms chapter summaries further reading lists

language and context breaks new ground in our understanding of the relationship between register genre and context leckie tarry argues convincingly and engagingly for a functional theory of language which specifies register in terms of contextual and linguistic features and which suggests a discursive relationship between the two moving beyond the limits of much of today's theory this accessible volume develops a theoretical understanding of the relationship between text context language function and linguistic form helen leckie tarry a specialist in the area of register and applied linguistics died in 1991 aged 49 although she had finished a large part of this work her notes and draft chapters have been extensively edited by professor david birch david birch is currently professor of communication and media studies at central queensland university australia and previously taught at murdoch university western australia and the national university of singapore

linguistic theory in america

in linguistic theory robert de beaugrande analyses linguistic theories not as abstract ideas or theses but as the process and product of theoretical discourse he argues that the best documentation of this discourse can be found in the fundamental works of major linguists from ferdinand de saussure to teun van dijk and walter kintsch he therefore employs the highly unusual strategy of a close reading of these works as discourse performances and strives to uncover their main points and characteristic moves in the linguist's own words through this approach the reader is able to appreciate and understand the variety and controversy among linguistic theories as they have emerged and developed in interaction with each other special scrutiny is allocated to the issue of how far the active practice of the linguists followed their own theories and proposals and why the author concludes by assessing the prospects for linguistics to be drawn from the retrospect in the previous chapters

written by two of the foremost researchers in the field the book benefits from their insight into conceptual issues their understanding of experimentation and their own pioneering research

in a controversial look at the study of linguistics today mortizma mahmoudian examines twentieth century theories of language in light of empirical evidence in the past linguists have had to choose between a general linguistic theory aimed at universal explanatory power and specific limited linguistic models arguing that at various levels of linguistic analysis different theories offer more or less explanatory power mahmoudian makes a persuasive case for an integrated approach incorporating the strengths of both methods the author begins with the identification of principles which despite differences in terminology are held in common by most twentieth century linguists he shows the implications merits and shortcomings of the major schools of linguistic thought as well as the techniques one can use in gathering data ranging over a wide variety of international linguistic thinking mahmoudian takes up the question of what he calls experimentation or the extent to which the application of certain linguistic theories have validity in constructing models

simultaneously a survey of the current state of linguistic theory and a case for the necessity of empirical verification in linguistics modern theories of language builds a bridge across the gulf between many long standing conflicts in the theory of language accessibly written this provocative work predicts future theoretical and epistemological developments and will prove essential reading for students and scholars of linguistics as well as specialists in cognitive psychology and romance languages

this two volume work examines every aspect of language change and two centuries of linguistic approaches towards understanding it the enterprise opens with a consideration of the nature of language and what constitutes language change gary miller argues that a single overarching theory is insufficient to encompass the protean mix of linguistic social political and cognitive factors involved in linguistic diachrony he analyzes general processes of phonetic phonological morphological and syntactic change and explores their origins causes and effects to support his analyses he provides detailed case studies of such phenomena as the middle english vowels the history of english do and development of the feminine gender in indo european he offers a balanced approach to the effects of first language acquisition describes general and specific processes including grammaticalization and creolization and examines the role of differential rates of change in regional and dialectal variation he reveals that several fundamental concepts in historical linguistics are much older than conventionally assumed in its comprehensive approach and great linguistic and historical range this is a contribution of enduring use and value to historical linguistics and linguistic theory volume i examines topics involving change in different components of the grammar from the perspectives of theory acquisition variation and motivation gary miller investigates traditional concerns such as variation and lexical diffusion and considers their impact on contemporary issues he discusses the interaction of articulatory and perceptual factors the implications of naturalness for expected changes and the consequences of alterations of syllable timing for contemporary theory the volume closes with a description of and motivations for vowel shifts in volume ii the focus turns to morphological and syntactic language changes by most theoretical accounts morphology is not autonomous but interacts with at least three other domains i phonology and perception ii the lexicon culture and iii syntax having addressed the first of these extensively in volume i gary miller illustrates the second with the rise of the feminine gender in indo european and the third by documentation of the changes from latin to romance in the coding of reflexive anticausative middle and passive he shows how syntactic change is micro parametric and is typically motivated by changes in lexical features including the numerous shifts from lexical to functional content as well as changes within functional categories finally he considers the genesis of creole inflectional derivational and syntactic categories involving the interaction of contact phenomena with morphological and syntactic change

a textbook that presents a sample of the more popular approaches to linguistic theorizing

this volume presents a selection of the best papers from the 2000 going romance conference held in utrecht the papers discuss current topics in formal syntax in romance languages

from being the occupation of a marginal and frequently marginalised group of researchers the linguistic analysis of machine readable language corpora has moved to the mainstream of research on the English language in this process an impressive body of results has accumulated which over and above the intrinsic descriptive interest it holds for students of the English language forces a major and systematic rethinking of foundational issues in linguistic theory corpus linguistics and linguistic theory was accordingly chosen as the motto for the twentieth annual gathering of the International Computer Archive of Modern Medieval English which was hosted by the University of Freiburg Germany in 1999 the present volume which presents selected papers from this conference thus builds on previous successful work in the computer aided description of English and at the same time represents an attempt at stock taking and methodological reflection in a linguistic subdiscipline that has clearly come of age contributions cover all levels of linguistic description from phonology prosody through grammar and semantics to discourse analytical issues such as genre or gender specific linguistic usage they are united by a desire to further the dialogue between the corpus linguistic community and researchers working in other traditions thereby the atmosphere ranges from undisguised skepticism as expressed by Noam Chomsky in an interview which is part of the opening contribution by Bas Aarts to empirically substantiated optimism as for example in Bernadette Vine's significantly titled contribution *Getting things done*

although there has been a significant revival in interest in Bertrand Russell's work in recent years most professional philosophers would still argue that Russell was not interested in language here in the first full length study of Russell's work on language throughout his long career Keith Green shows that this is in fact not the case in examining Russell's work particularly from 1900 to 1950 Green exposes a repeated emphasis on and turn to linguistic considerations Green considers how linguistics and philosophy were struggling in the twentieth century to define themselves and to create appropriate contemporary disciplines they had much in common during certain periods yet seemed to continue in almost total ignorance of one another this negative relation has been noted in the past by Roy Harris whose work provides some of the inspiration for the present book taking those two aspects Green's aim here is to provide the first full length consideration of Russell's varied work in language and to read it in the context of developing contemporary i.e. with Russell's work linguistic theory the main aims of this important new book in focusing exclusively on Russell's work on language throughout his career are to place Russell within the changing contexts of contemporary linguistic thought to read Russell's language theories against the grain of his own linguistic practice to assess the relationship between linguistic and philosophical thought during Russell's career and to reassess his place in the history of linguistic thought in the twentieth century as such this fascinating study will make a vital contribution to Russell studies and to the study of the relationship between philosophy and linguistics

this volume brings together a selection of papers from the eighteenth going Romance Symposium held at Leiden University 9-11 December 2004 these papers cover a broad range of topics in phonology morphology syntax semantics historical linguistics and acquisition in a variety of Romance languages

the relationship of theoretical and applied linguistics has lately prompted numerous debates this volume originated at one of them the essence of most of the chapters of all of them except Fraser's and Davies's was actually presented at the round table on the relationships of theoretical and applied linguistics organized during the 7th world congress of applied linguistics held in Brussels in August 1984 individually and collectively the chapters assembled here offer support to the idea that applied linguistics should not be juxtaposed to theoretical linguistics it is a field of research with theoretical as well as applied aspects written by different authors from a wide variety of different countries the chapters may at times express views that are not totally consistent nevertheless we believe that the variability of viewpoints counts among the merits rather than the defaults of this internationally written and edited volume it is our hope that it will prove stimulating to linguists and practitioners in related fields and instructive to students we wish to express our thanks to Albert Valdman for the interest he has shown in the volume and to record our appreciation to our editors in particular Eliot Werner and Declan Scully for their tolerance and patience

the annual going romance conference is the major European discussion forum for theoretically relevant research on Romance languages where current ideas about language in general and about Romance languages in particular are tested starting with the thirteenth conference held in 1999 volumes with selected papers of the conferences are published under the title Romance Languages and Linguistic Theory this is the fifth such volume containing a selection of papers that have been presented at the seventeenth going romance conference held at the Radboud University Nijmegen the Netherlands from 20-22 November 2003 the three day program included a workshop on diachronic phonology the present volume contains a broad range of articles dealing not only with syntax and phonology but also with morphology semantics and acquisition of the Romance languages

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
