since its formation in 1974 the internationally renowned performing group from scratch has developed a distinctive style of music using sophisticated rhythmic language and unique sculptural instruments group founder philip dadson and longtime member don mcglashan have translated this twenty years of experience in to the exercises and game forms presented in the from scratch rhythm workbook this hands on resource uses a body based approach to rhythm and sound including clapping stamping and simple vocals a wide range of rhythmic and compositional concepts are introduced in exercises that are both fun to do and musically satisfying in themselves the introductions and discussion notes accompanying each exercise emphasize natural functions such as heartbeat breathing sleeping waking and walking to illustrate that our bodies are organized rhythmic systems and that this natural rhythm is the best basis for developing rhythmic skills

various tasks activities and learning experiences are presented to help students master the basic music fundamentals

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children s play activities show that they all have a good sense of rhythm it is obvious to anyone that has observed how children recite rhymes march rock their dolls or skip a rope the reason that a music instructor may encounter certain difficulties in teaching students to read and understand musical rhythms is usually not their lack of sense of rhythm rather it is the inability of young children to correlate it with the way we write music the exercises in my first book of rhythm are intended to bridge the gap between children s habitual rhythmic activities and the principles of writing the rhythm in music they are based on close analogies that are found between rhythm of speech and

rhythm of music the length of the words and note values or length of the music bars stresses in the words and strong and weak beats in music etc for these exercises we use simple children s rhymes short phrases and simple words of different length and phonetic structure reciting clapping and counting such speech patterns help children little by little to correlate them with the ideas of regular musical pulse different note values music bars strong and weak beats and so on after such exercises the process of learning to read musical rhythm goes much smoother in each chapter of the book one aspect of the rhythm is explored my first book of rhythm part one is focused on musical pulse the length of musical sounds and different note and rest values up to eighth notes and including dotted quarters and the bar structure of music

this book is for both the beginning guitarist or the more experienced guitarist who wishes to improve their technique all aspects of the physical act of playing the guitar are covered from how to hold a guitar to the specific way each hand is involved in the playing process pictures are provided within the book to help clarify each technique more valuable explanatory pictures and videos can be downloaded for free at muse eek com this book is excerpted from 1st steps for a beginning guitarist volume one
